Red Line for Gaza

A number of Charities – including *Oxfam* and *Christian Aid*, are inviting people to join the **'Red Line for Gaza'** campaign. At its heart it is an expression of great concern for the ordinary people of Gaza who are undergoing the most appalling and disastrous set of circumstances.

What Hamas did in October 2023 is utterly repulsive and unforgivable. In response, the Israeli Government have initiated a bombardment and a military invasion of the territory which, coupled with starvation – in spite of denials – has resulted in the wholesale destruction of homes and livelihoods and a huge number of deaths of innocent men, women and children. The Israeli Government has crossed many, many red lines set by the International Community, let alone the standards of compassion and human decency.

Christian Aid is calling on churches and individual Christians to demonstrate their support for the people of Gaza. The meeting of our Church Council in late September agreed to add our voice to the appeal. On Sunday 12th October, which is our Harvest Festival Sunday, we ask members of the congregation to wear prominently some thing red. After Church we will stand for a short time in a line outside the Church as a visible sign to our community of our concern and our wish to be identified with the people of Gaza and their suffering.

We are also being encouraged to write to our MP – there will be a template letter for you to take to use as a base for your own letter. Church Council also agreed to send a letter to Liz Jarvis, the Eastleigh MP, copies of which will be available on Harvest Sunday. To find out more, follow the link:

Caring for our Planet – Circuit Eco Event

Here are a few more details for you. As you know this will be on **Saturday 18th April 2026** from 10 am – 4 pm at our Church. We are planning different activities during the day so that this free event will be accessible to all ages. These include:

Science dome – Two 30 minutes films will be offered throughout the day in a large inflatable science dome, which will be situated in the sanctuary. We will be inviting people to sign up to a session when they arrive. The dome is accessible for wheelchair users and chairs can be placed inside for those with limited mobility. Up to 50 people can be accommodated at a time, although this will be less if chairs and wheelchairs are included. Film options in the dome will be:

- 1. Dynamic earth "an immersive full dome program that explores the inner workings of Earth's climate engine"
- 2. Plastics in the sea/under the sea

Creative zone – The craft zone will be themed around Bees and Muddy church resources and will include the opportunity to make bee prints, a bug hotel and wind spirals, using a lot of recycled material. There will also be an opportunity to help make or decorate pallet planters, to decorate pots and add seed, and there will be activity sheets throughout the venue.

Seminar room – Two speakers have been booked for the day: Steve Collins (Net Zero Carbon Program Manager, Guildford, Portsmouth and Chichester) and Ruth Valerio (Programmes, Partnerships and Advocacy Director, Embrace the Middle East, formerly of *A Rocha*). They will be offering half hour seminars, with the opportunity for questions in between sessions, and a question-and-answer session towards the end of the day.

There will be other things going on all day. More information in the next edition of *The Link*. You can see what an important event this will be for our church as the venue. So, when the time comes, please sign up to help as welcomers, stewards, helpers with refreshments and so on. You won't be expected to be on duty all day giving you the opportunity to have a look round and join in.

Let us know if you can publicise this to local groups because it is for the whole community not only the Circuit. We will be in touch with local schools to involve them. Pray that will be a witness to our Christian calling to be good stewards of God's creation.

Methodist Women in Britain

The Quiet Morning was a restful, refreshing time when we forgot all about the busyness of everyday life. Hilary Evans had prepared on the theme of the sea and began with a reading from Genesis 1 about creation. We thought about the pleasures of going to the seaside, those for whom the sea is their workplace but, also, the dangers associated with it. In silence we were encouraged to do something on our own, look at the lovely selection of books about the coast, write a poem or story or be more creative using the multiple craft items provided.

We came together then to share what we had been doing and our thoughts and memories of the sea. Then more time to be quiet on our own and finishing with prayer. Coffee and biscuits were available all morning. Home again, driving through the beautiful Hampshire countryside and truly blessed by God.

The Honeypot Charity – Giving support to this charity is the new Circuit *Methodist Women in Britain* project for the 2025/26 Connexional year. The charity gives support to children aged 5 – 12 who are bearing the heavy load of caring for a parent or sibling, often single-handedly. Quite often this can take over 30 hours a week, and so their experiences can be very different from that of their peers at school – affecting their schooling, social opportunities and the chance to make happy childhood memories and build brighter futures.

This is where *Honeypot* can help. The charity has a house with large grounds in the New Forest where they take referred children for respite breaks, making memorable days with lots of fun, laughter and loving care. They also continue to give the family pastoral support when the children return home. They get no financial support from the government so fund-raising is very important to them. This is where we can help.

Barbara and Joyce recently had an opportunity to see and hear an informative and moving presentation about *Honeypot* given by a very enthusiastic lady called **Viv Carter**. We hope you will be able to meet Viv soon. Incidentally, she was the first speaker at the Men's Supper Club this session, so speak to one of their members about the charity too. The Thursday morning Service at 10.30 am on 9th October, written and led by the MWiB Circuit team, will feature caring for each other and particularly the work of child carers.

Viv was selling little knitted and crocheted bees for £1 each. If you can knit or crotchet Joyce has the patterns. If you have any double knitting wool in bright yellow or orange, black and white wool please let her know – we can make use of even small lengths. That will be a start. Look for other MWiB events to raise money for *Honeypot* throughout the year.

There is a **Global Relationships** session as part of Wholehearted Monthly on **14th October**. The main session starts at 7 pm and from 8 pm the Global Relationships room will host 'How do indigenous women evangelize in their communities?' 2/9 Today it was our pleasure to meet our new Minister, Rachael Hawkins, and she had been asked to tell us about her life story to date. This proved to be a very full and wonderful life, with much travelling and changes of home location. Rachael wove into her narrative the idea that life is about the journey, rather than the destination. She illustrated major changes in direction by a series of road signs along the way. We were challenged to think of what our own road signs might be?

Rachael took us on a tour through her life's journey – through childhood, university, work and her calling to the Ministry, along with

her family life – marriage and two sons, with much interesting details along the way. Rachael finished with a reference to the 23rd Psalm pointing out how God had always been on the journey with her, even in the bumpy places. And if you wish to know more about Rachael, "ask a member of the Women's Fellowship because we know it all" in the words of our gracious leader.

9/9 Our meeting this week was **the A.G.M.**, and followed its usual pattern. Barbara, as President, thanked people for the work behind the scenes that makes our meetings so popular, and members were also thanked for introducing new people to boost our numbers.

One highlight deserving a special mention this year was the 95th Anniversary, which went off splendidly. Another noteworthy item in our meeting was the Treasurer's report. A suitably indignant Brenda informed us that *Lloyds Bank* have now decided to charge us a worryingly large standing fee, even for months when there are no transactions. No problem as Barbara soon got everyone to vote an increase in the entrance charge to ensure that we keep going. Similarly, we agreed on proposed donations to be made this year and also our Project for the year, which will be the same as the District i.e. *Honeypot Young Carer's charity*, which supports young carers and vulnerable children between 5 and 12 years of age.

Jenny Heal and Hillary Saunders were formally voted onto the committee as planners, and all the other members agreed to carry on with their roles. Any other business was gently dispatched and our meeting closed with the welcome tea, cake and conversation.

16/9 **Peter Castle** was our guest speaker today and his subject was his work as a Lay Minister, with responsibility for three chapels – each very different. He told us mostly about Canada Common, and he also assists Kate Cambridge in Eastleigh and Bishopstoke. Peter oversees every aspect of church life in Canada Common as there is no longer a regular congregation, so events where the church can outreach into the community are the best way to spread Christianity. We heard an impressive range of activities planned for the coming months – everything from a visit from high ranking church officials to Messy

Church and the puppets. He is also very involved with the *Churches Together* project and often works with Anglican friends. We are all welcome to join in any these events

Peter's chief passion is clearly to promote the importance of prayer and he believes that small groups help towards this. Prayer should not be a shopping list of our needs but to ask what the Lord wants us to do today and place our gifts and talents before Him. The effectiveness of Peter's focus on prayer is reflected in the growing numbers of attendees at his church events.

23/9 Today **Richard Wright** was wearing his entertainers hat! First we had a very scholarly history of entertainment in the UK, which he admitted had been furnished by AI (too good for a mere mortal).

Then there were interesting facts, songs and poems to illustrate his theme and put a fresh slant on favourite tunes.
